Sharing the Ways of Standing Rock Continues: A Call for Support to Our Universalist Unitarian Relatives

Dear Relatives,

We send this letter urging your most careful consideration to a critically urgent need for support of a unique event that aspires to address the environmental and spiritual crisis that now encompasses us all.

We invite you to support the upcoming *Stories and Songs of the People* event, An InterNātional Grass Roots Gathering: 'For the Generations to Come'. This event is to be held in the Sacred Black Hills (Paha Sapa) of South Dakota August 22nd – 25th. Our call is to all Cultural Knowledge Bearers and Keepers, Elders, Water Protectors, Youth Councils, Faith Keepers, Wellbeing/Wellness Practitioners, Healers, Environmental Science Practitioners, Environmental Law Practitioners, Scholars, Treaty Scholars, Performing and Visual Artists, Film Makers and

Presenters. (see <u>https://www.storiesandsongs.org/</u>)

This Gathering is a continuation of a journey that was brought by the historic events at Oceti Sakowin Camp, Standing Rock, 2016-17. Those who in 2016 responded by travelling to Standing Rock were transformed by the intentional, prayer-based, non-violent action on which the camp was predicated. This camp grew from the Lakota, Dakota and Nakota way of gathering, with international peoples of many cultures and faiths joining in solidarity. There we understood the cultural obligation to shelter, feed, and care for all people who arrived to the camp. Tens of thousands of people (including many UUs) came to camp. Of these, too many were ill-prepared to take care of themselves and unaware of the conditions they were entering. These conditions included cultural considerations and practice, as well as an awareness of the support needed to maintain a camp of its size and nature and the costs borne by the people. Yet all who came were provided for nonetheless, as that is the way of the people.

As with Oceti Sakowin Camp, everyone who attends the August Gathering will have the benefit of shelter, food, emotional and spiritual care, according to their needs. Many of those who are most important to the success of this gathering, such as Native Elders, activists, and youth, require the most assistance to travel to the camp in order to participate. It is essential to enable participation by those who are not financially privileged.

INITC, through its program *Stories and Songs of the People*, has held more than a dozen events across this country and InterNātionally, many of them associated with Unitarian Universalist venues including: one General Assemblies (2018 Kansas City), the Mid-America Regional

Assembly (2016 Oakbrook IL) and multiple UU churches across the nation (including Peoria IL, The All Souls Church Washington DC, Kansas City and Bismarck ND) 1

There are great financial costs to make this gathering possible, food and shelter the most significant. There are, however, still many other requirements for a successful gathering; travel across the Dakotas prior to camp to hear the voices of our Elders; transportation needs (near and afar); materials; projectors; stage; and even toilets with signage to ensure inclusivity!

There are cultural differences in the approach to many of the processes associated with this gathering, and there are things we can learn from each other, when we learn how to make a safe space for making agreement on what it means to be a human being. To address the looming spiritual and environmental crises requires a level of creative thinking outside the realms of systems and models that brought us to this critical juncture. The desire and need for full participation, not restricted by barriers of income or resources, makes it possible for everyone to be present in a good way.

The awakening from Standing Rock continues. Let us find courage in our hearts and minds and spirits to help each other in the pathways that are open to us, recognizing that we give not to an individual or an organization, but to our relatives and to the people. These then, are the genuine opportunities to begin to shift a paradigm for the generations to come, and as such become themselves part of the Stories and Songs of the People...

Since its inception in 1999 through the present the 'Stories and Songs of the

People'¹ mission, in simplicity, is to help create a space that engenders and allows for InterNātional participation in the sharing and exchange of knowledge, experiences, cultural practice and cultural expression. Each succeeding event, whether a conference, festival, seminar, presentation has been a unique opportunity to embed this process within a larger global framework, defining space for conversations and collaborative efforts with First Nations, educational institutions, NGO's, community organizations and wider community members as well.

Along the way these events have encompassed an ever - widening cultural and educational exchange of complex cultural 'methodologies.' These methods share a collective intent; recognizing diversity as central to how we define what it means 'to be a human being' and widening our perspectives to understand the myriad of ways we define our relationship to environment, both traditionally and contemporary. Some key components for 'Stories and Songs of the People' also included:

- InterNātional First Nations collaborations;
- International collaborations;
- Wider community and community organization collaborations;
- Cultural Presentations and Cultural Ways of Expression;
- Identified appropriate methodologies for facilitating presentations and forums;

- The Sharing and Strengthening of Cultural Knowledge and Cultural Practice;
- The Creation of platforms that invite wider community involvement, participation and discussion;
- The recognition of Trauma (Inter-generational and inter-cultural);
- Interfaith and Intercultural gathering and exchange; and,
- A shared understanding for ideas of Cultural Safety.

The "Stories and Songs of the People" project is unique in that the primary purpose is not of a commercial nature, but rather developed as a framework for the InterNātional sharing for our collective capacity building. The foremost purpose is to help identify, recognize and employ cultural strengths in practice for the myriad of issues common to both First Nations and non-first nations People; locally, regionally, nationally and InterNātion. From a shared First Nations cultural platform Stories and Songs have engendered this participation while investigating common practices. These have often included areas of understanding about law and governance, environment, society and resource management, education and other key components to shared understanding through intercultural and interfaith activities; retreats, conferences and gatherings.

Through the activities of Stories and Songs of the People two key initiatives have arisen:



InterNational Initiative for Transformative Collaboration (INITC)

There is a growing recognition amongst non – first nations institutions, organizations and wider community members that language must adapt to encompass wider perspectives and greater understanding. Eurocentric and Anglo-centric ideas of classification such as 'American Indians' / 'Red Indians' or 'Aboriginal' are disingenuous. These are historical perspectives from ways



of viewing the world, amalgamating First Nations People to an inequitable position, perpetuating ideas and perspectives that have historically and continue to marginalize Frist Nations knowledge, Cultural and Spiritual Practice. We come from many Nations...

INITC proposes transformation through the recognition of emotional, mental, physical and spiritual change – critical to genuine transformative collaboration. As a co-defined First Nations format and process for sharing cultural perspectives and practice, an underlying notion is the recognition that we *all* come from many Nations – sovereign in their own right. Thus, the product of our collective and collaborative efforts is described as InterNātional. (pronounced inter-nay-shen-al)

The Inter-National Indigenous Peoples Village Inc. (INIPV)

INIPV Inc. is the result of many First Nations, non-first nations, institutional organizations, community organizations and individuals working together to form an appropriate village space for InterNātional

presenters, performers, cultural practitioners, participants and guests.

Starting in 2010, Stories and Songs of the People collaborative events embedded the initial InterNātional Indigenous Peoples Village in an established standing festival as a collaborative partner to global community – oriented events.



Establishing the INIPV successfully brought thousands of participants a unique opportunity for sharing First Nations cultural knowledge and practice through Cultural Presenters, Speakers, Elders, Performers, Artists and Wisdom Keepers from the *Stories and Songs of the People* foundation of InterNational collaborative and collective efforts. These efforts continue today through ongoing events now hosted by 'Nation' and delivered through the *Stories and Songs of the People* events platform.

The Human impact

Join us in creating spaces where Transformative Collaborative efforts for shifting paradigms become the possible rather than the impossible; Through intercultural, interfaith and educational exchange, collaborative capacity enhancement and development (for all), specified and defined workshops, seminars and conferences, gatherings (with special seminars for invited guests) and spiritual retreats and reflection.
